

Cycling in Windsor Great Park

The sheer size of Windsor Great Park makes cycling the ideal way to explore its four-and-a-half thousand acres. Motor vehicles and motor cycles are restricted, so apart from the occasional estate vehicle you will enjoy generally vehicle-free roads and tracks.

Cycling is permitted ...

... during daylight hours only, along the routes shown on the map. Cycling is not allowed on any other roads or tracks. Off-road cycling is also forbidden.

Rules of the road

When cycling, you must slow down for (and, where necessary, give way to):

- Motor vehicles
- Horse riders
- Pedestrians
- Animals

Please keep to the left when cycling, and in all other respects follow the rules as if you were cycling on a public road.

Take special care when there are children or dogs running about, and if necessary dismount to pass by safely.

Things to see

The view north to Windsor Castle from The Copper Horse is one of the finest vistas in the world

There are two other fine equestrian statues in the park: the Jubilee Statue (of HM The Queen) and the Prince Consort Statue—both shown on the map.

The Savill Garden is England's finest woodland garden. The Savill Building, next to the garden, is the park's Visitor Centre and provides refreshments and shopping from 10am to 6pm (4.30pm in winter)

Virginia Water was once the UK's largest man-made lake. Look out for the great Cascade and the ancient Ruins brought from Leptis Magna in Africa.
